Mr. Wickerham, County Administrator, reviewed the following Agenda items:

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Authorizing the taking of an avigation easement for a parcel in the Town of Milton to remove an obstruction to the County Airport, including such interim tasks as may be required. (Mark Rider, County Attorney)

Mr. Wickerham said currently, a tree is in the flight path of one of the runways.

Authorizing the Chairman to petition the Public Facilities Commission for an extension of the Heritage Springs Water Corporation to include a water main to the County Airport. (Mark Rider, County Attorney)

EQUALIZATION AND ASSESSMENT

Authorizing corrections to the 2009 tax roll in the Towns of Clifton Park (\$12,173.22) and Saratoga (\$3,576.61). (Carol Holley, Real Property Tax Director)

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Amending the budget to appropriate an additional \$6,000 in appropriations and revenues for the County Planning Conference. (Jason Kemper, Planning Director)

Authorizing the Chairman to enter into a management agreement with the Wilton Wildlife and Preserve to manage a parcel of County forest land at no cost to the County. (Jason Kemper, Planning Director)

Amending the boundaries of Consolidated Agricultural District #2 to include the Glenn Farm in the Town of Galway. (Jason Kemper, Planning Director)

PUBLIC HEALTH

Authorizing the Chairman to accept an additional \$1,194 in State funding for Transitional Services Association, Inc. and amending the budget under Mental Health. (Dale Angstadt, Mental Health Director)

LEGISLATIVE AND RESEARCH

Urging the NYS Legislature to support the State's Farmland Protection Program and Environmental Protection Fund. (Jason Kemper, Planning Director)

Mr. Wickerham stated the Governor has proposed making cuts there as he tries to balance the budget.

Supporting NYS Senate Bill S.255/S.256 sponsored by Senator Elizabeth Little proposing amendments to Real Property Tax Law in relation to the taxation of property owned by a cooperative corporation. (Mark Rider, County Attorney)

Mr. Wickerham said condos pay the same tax base as single-family homes.

SOCIAL PROGRAMS

Authorizing Chairman to enter into renewal contracts for the Expanded in Home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP) to provide personal aide care to the elderly. (Sandi Cross, Office for the Aging Director)

Mr. Wickerham stated this is the same rate as 2008, and the rate is set by Medicaid.

Authorizing Chairman to enter into renewal contract with a registered dietician to provide nutrition services to the Office for Aging at a cost of \$35.00 per hour. (Sandi Cross, Office for the Aging Director)

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Mr. Wickerham stated she will work just under 1,000 hours per year.

Authorizing the Chairman to enter into a contract with Capitaland Taxi to provide transportation for seniors in the Towns of Charlton, Edinburg, Galway, Providence, and Saratoga at a cost not to exceed \$26,920. (Sandi Cross, Office for the Aging Director)

Mr. Wickerham said it is the same rate as last year, and there is no county match on that particular program.

Authorizing the Chairman to accept a \$100,000 Legislative Grant in the Office for the Aging and amending the budget in relation thereto. (Sandi Cross, Office for the Aging Director)

Mr. Wickerham said this will be parceled out to a number of senior organizations.

Authorizing the Chairman to enter into an agreement with Evergreen Adult Day Care to provide social adult day care services at cost not to exceed \$84,000. (Sandi Cross, Office for the Aging Director)

PUBLIC SAFETY

Authorizing the Chairman to enter into an agreement with Motorola Inc. to purchase 1,700 pagers at a cost of \$559,130. (Paul Lent, Emergency Services Director)

Mr. Wickerham said this was the lowest of three bids.

Authorizing settlement of multi-County litigation against pharmaceutical companies as follows:

The invocation was given by Tom Wood, Chaplain.

PUBLIC INPUT

Dave Cummings, of the Saratoga County Farm Bureau, said this is his fourth annual opportunity to provide comments to the Board on behalf of the Saratoga County Farm Bureau and its equine community. They distributed informational packets from the Farm Bureau to the Supervisors.

Mr. Cummings stated the following:

"With the last USDA survey, there are almost 12,000 equines in Saratoga County. The value is estimated to be \$250.5 million dollars. New York State's equine industry is estimated at worth more than a billion dollars, and Saratoga should garner every bit of that industry, as possible. Official surveys suggest that 80% of horse people in New York are involved in recreational or pleasure riding or driving. Most of our Saratoga equines exist on small breeders' farms and in the backyards of equine lovers. The ability to sustain this reality, with its beautiful imagery, is dependent on continued cooperation at all levels of government. Specific actions on better tax credits and the nuances of legislative language are not overlooked or under appreciated. Last year, we know you supported an extension of the ten-year real property tax exemption on farm buildings; this was accomplished with a new sunset date of 2019. We would have preferred no sunset date, as a clear affirmation that all levels of government support agriculture. The exemption helps save money on new construction and provides a clear incentive to continue to invest in agricultural operations. Further, ag assessment deliberations and applications need to be inclusive vs. conducted with an exclusive attitude. We ask that you reinforce this point with your respective assessors, building inspectors, and planning and zoning boards. We know farms demand less of infrastructure services than new housing developments. We know a balance can be struck with residential and commercial developments. In this positive attitude, we can keep some lands in production while recognizing Saratoga's continued economic growth on all fronts.

"The funding and processing of Purchase of Development Rights, while recognized in last year's budget approval, is still inadequate. As your budget allows, please continue and expand efforts for this worthy approach to keep lands in agriculture. Open space is a means for low impact tourism and small-sized equine farming development to increase county tax revenues. Approve the real estate two-percent transfer tax in the County and your towns.

"The continuance of a thoroughbred franchise award to NYRA leaves issues open to debate with potential negative impacts on the industry and the region. We are happy that your committee and board leaders advocate for inclusion in the NYRA and New York State Racing and Wagering Board decision-making process. Revenue to keep purse structures and breeders' awards competitive with other states will only enhance our citizens to stay employed and spending in our local economy. Official surveys reflect that thousands of horse people in New York are in a business proposition with breeding and racing. They are part of the agricultural product. Any revenue streams, deductions or credits keep our farm dreams afloat.

"The CCE Equine program has provided valuable service in saving producers money, in networking equine markets, in educating current and future horse farmers and the general public. Some of you have participated in the farm tours. But funding is vulnerable. Washington County decreased support to what we see as sister services in the Ag Economic Development position. Some express reluctance to ask for more funds or to take chances in expanding opportunities to the greater equine community. Some seem to think fiscal support to

equine jeopardizes other agricultural funding. Don't get caught in those turf wars. All programs are compatible and mutually supportive. The CCE equine leadership group is demonstrating its merit to the local consumers. They have guided some two and a half million dollars impact in services for not only the equine community, but for the spin-off positive effect in other agriculture endeavors. The horse symposium is an outstanding program. Participate in the April 18th program and see the motivated, involved children and their families. These families support and sustain economic equine viability.

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"The Board of Supervisors should incorporate members of the equine community to develop plans for both short-term and long-term elements of a regional horse park which were discovered and identified in the feasibility study phase. Ownership of equines in Saratoga seems to have three primary orientations: 1) pleasure equines for back yard and trail riding; 2) working equines for logging, plowing, cartage and transportation; and 3) breeding and training of equines for competition in eventing and racing programs. All of these might be served by diligent development of sound programmatic and fiscal planning.

"In closing, let me wax a bit eloquent with some horse sense. The horses, small farms and entertainment equine sites are gems in the tiara that is Saratoga. Let's not lose that inherent relationship and continue to add more gems in both the small settings as well as settings that might draw even more equine enthusiasts to our beautiful County.

"The Saratoga County Farm Bureau stands ready to continue to work on keeping the tiara polished. Thank you."

John Arnold, Membership Chair, Saratoga County Farm Bureau, stated his wife and he operate the Arnold Air Farm in the Town of Moreau. He said his family has owned and operated this dairy farm since 1969, and his family has farmed in Saratoga County for over 150 years. He said these are trying times for the economy as a whole, but the good news is Saratoga County is the only county in the State with increased farm numbers. The number of farms in Saratoga County are up 8%; number of acres and production; value of production up 75%. He said a lot of new farms are not large acreage farms. He thanked the Board for its support of agriculture in the County. He said he is on the Planning Board for the Town of Moreau and on the Rezoning Committee. He said they are looking at ways to deal with development and are still trying to maintain their agricultural community. He stated Cornell Cooperative Extension is there for the Saratoga County farmers with up to date technological information and educational programs. We appreciate all that they do and the County's support of their programs.

AUTHORIZING ALL STEPS NECESSARY TO OBTAIN AN AVIGATION EASEMENT OVER PARCEL 189.12-1-54 IN THE TOWN OF MILTON

WHEREAS, Resolution 192-08 authorized an agreement with North American Flight Services to remove 16 points of obstruction of the approach slope for airplanes landing at the Saratoga County airport; and

WHEREAS, the owners of parcel number 189.12-1-54 in the Town of Milton, on which one of said obstructions is located, has declined to allow its removal; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable and necessary to obtain an avigation easement over this property to remove the obstruction and to enhance the safety of planes landing at the airport by extending landing capabilities to night landings on runway 5; and

WHEREAS, funding from the FAA may be available to reimburse the county for most of the cost of obtaining an avigation easement; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that Saratoga County, its employees, agents and subcontractors are authorized to take any and all steps necessary to negotiate and obtain an avigation easement over parcel 189.12-1-54 in the Town of Milton by purchase or if necessary by eminent domain; and be it further

RESOLVED, that application is hereby authorized to be made to the Federal Aviation Administration for funding to reimburse Saratoga County for the costs of obtaining the easement.
