On a motion by Mr. Hargrave, seconded by Mr. Lucia, the minutes of the meeting of April 15, 2009 were approved unanimously.

PRESENTATION TO BILL BAKER:

Chairman Johnson said Bill Baker, our Personnel Director for over 20 years, has decided to throw in the towel on us, and he will be leaving as of Friday, and this Board wanted to publicly recognize him. He then read and presented Mr. Baker with a Proclamation on behalf of the Board of Supervisors.

Mr. Baker said he appreciated everyone's thoughts today, and he wished everyone well. He said it has been a great ride. You have all done what was in the best interest of the County employees, he said. I appreciate your vote of confidence through the years, he stated. He mentioned the resolution adopted by this Board in March appointing Jack Kalinkewicz as Personnel Director is a very positive thing for the County workforce.

Vice-Chairman Peck said on behalf of all of us, Bill, we appreciate your work and dedicated service, and your journey is just beginning.

Jack Kalinkewicz said we have been conducting a search for a Deputy Director, and with that, we have received two dozen or so applications. We interviewed a half dozen candidates who we felt could jump in and do the job, he said. With that, one individual stood out with her experience with the City of Saratoga Springs, labor relations, employee relations and civil service. He introduced Marcie Bridges from the City of Saratoga Springs. Ms. Bridges said she looks forward to meeting everyone, and she looks forward to this opportunity.

Vice-Chairman Peck welcomed Ms. Bridges aboard and wished her well.

Mr. Wickerham stated this will allow us to serve them as a customer.

Authorizing the Chairman to execute all the necessary agreements to accept a Federal Stimulus Grant in the amount of \$464,000 for the resurfacing of CR 108 (Dunning Street) in the Town of Malta. (Joe Ritchey, Public Works Department)

Amending the Public Works budget by increasing expenditures and revenues by \$464,000 to accommodate a Federal Stimulus Grant. (Joe Ritchey, Public Works Department)

PUBLIC SAFETY

Mr. Wickerham said this is only three months of the grant, and eventually, this grant may be eliminated entirely.

Authorizing the Chairman to amend the budget to accept a \$13,100 Legislative grant and authorizing the Chairman to enter into an agreement with ASR Systems Group, Inc. to provide secure shelving for criminal case files. (Jim Murphy, District Attorney)

Authorizing the Chairman to enter into agreements with Baron Utilities to complete work required to colocate County radio equipment at the FAA tower site in Stillwater at a cost of \$61,200. (Paul Lent, Emergency Services Director)

Mr. Wickerham stated this was the low of six bids.

SOCIAL PROGRAMS

Authorizing the Chairman to amend the budget to accept an additional \$236,228 in State aid for the Department of Social Services to pass through to the Probation Department and the Mental Health Department for juvenile delinquency services. (Bob Christopher, Social Services Commissioner)

Authorizing Workforce Investment Board budget for program year 2009 for \$88,467 and authorizing the Chairman to enter into agreements with Warren and Washington Counties and other entities to fund WIB services. (Tony Scavone, Employment and Training Director)

Mr. Wickerham said this is from \$24,000,000. Mr. Lawler said he believes a statement should be added to this resolution "with the appropriate increase in collateralization to that amount." Mr. Wickerham said absolutely we can do that.

Authorizing the Chairman to enter into an agreement with Brink's incorporated to provide cash courier serves for the Saratoga County Clerk at a rate of \$20 per trip. The payment to Brinks will actually be made by HSBC. (Kathy Marchione, County Clerk)

Mr. Wickerham stated we have to be the contractor since we are the customer.

Authorizing the Chairman to enter into an agreement with NYS Department of Transportation to accept \$1,700,000 in Federal stimulus funding for the construction of the Zim Smith Trail and amending the budget in relation thereto. (Jason Kemper, Planning Director)

PUBLIC INPUT

Barbara Shay, of the Town of Ballston, said after listening to plans that are moving forward more rapidly than she thought regarding the Zim Smith Trail, as they relate to their quality of life at the end of Zepko Lane, she and her husband, Tim Smith, have some issues. She said they have a deeded right of way right on the trail that crosses the track on Zepko Lane, and that is the exit and entrance to their home. She asked if the County's legal people looked at that and what that deeded right of way really means and what their liability and responsibilities are related to that. What are the barriers and signs that will be put on, and what is their liability if someone gets injured on that property or inadvertently goes down their driveway? If plans are shovel ready, what has been done to insure they will not have any unnecessary liability? She said they purchased the property 21 years ago,

and they own 90 acres back there, pay taxes. When you own more, you pay more, and for that privilege, we contribute to the County as well, she said. The trail coming through there will have an aesthetic impact on their quality of life. We question whether or not this is the appropriate place for that trail, she said. Has anyone actually looked at where that trail will be down there, she asked.

Vice-Chairman Peck said hopefully, the County Planner Mr. Kemper and the County Attorney will continue to look at the issues.

Brandi Burns, 145 Oak Street, Ballston Spa, said she has a lot of issues, and she sent a letter to Supervisor Southworth, her Town Supervisor, who has given each Supervisor a copy. We are asking everybody to please look at where this trail is going and make your own decision, she said. This bike path will end at my front door on Oak Street, she added. What is the extent of the liability the County will be under. It is my understanding the railroad will be asking for a \$10 million indemnification. Has anyone asked the County insurance company if this can be done, she asked. She stated they are worried about the safety of people on the bike path. Amtrak goes through there at 60 mph and freight trains at 40 mph. She said last month, there were two railroad fatalities in New York State. She stated railroad tracks are attractive nuisances. She stated it is her understanding C.P. Rail will not allow this path to be open in the wintertime, so it will not be open to snowmobilers, so there will have to be a fence between the bike path and the railroad and also between her house and the bike path. Once that is done, there will be no public access to see what is going on there, and that can be an attractive nuisance to the wrong people, she said. She stated if you look at the property, this will pas 20 feet from the front door of her house. I am a public official, and as a judge, I may be targeted, she said. She said her neighbors are also concerned, because people will be parking up and down Oak Street which is a very private neighborhood. We all look out for one another, she said. Please do your homework, and feel free to come to my house before you vote on it, she added.

Mrs. Plummer reminded everyone of the Supervisors' Chicken Barbecue the first Wednesday in June.

PUBLIC INPUT

Pam Morin, said she was brought up in Lake George, and she is a member of the North Warren Chamber of Commerce. She said as a project of the Quadricentennial, all Supervisors should have received a copy of a "Sister Map" to the 2007 Hudson Valley Tourism Association Map that they are producing. This map project theme shall be "A Touch of Dutch and A Fringe of French", from Essex to Albany. She stated the first edition of the "Sister Map" is to become an educational tool and souvenir to be given to schools, 7th graders and libraries along the Hudson River. She said they are requesting \$5,000 from Saratoga County and \$3,000 from its townships towards the cost of producing this map. She said on board to date are the Towns of Lake Luzerne, Horicon, Chester, Stony Creek, Warrensburg, Queensbury and Warren County. With that, we will be able to at least produce 40,000 copies, she said. She said she can e-mail their power point presentation to those who would like it. She stated they will distribute the map packets to schools along the Hudson River from Essex to Albany. The second portion will go to the libraries, and the third to our partners to be distributed to TPA offices and their local Chambers of Commerce.

Chairman Johnson advised Ms. Morin that this Board will take her request into consideration.

Ron Revers, CSEA President for Saratoga County, stated it is his understanding that today this Board will be voting on a resolution to accept stimulus money to repave some roads in Saratoga County. He stated that pavement of Saratoga County roads is the responsibility of Saratoga County employees. I am here to protect my workers' rights in their jobs, he said. He said he has been asked numerous times to help work through problems in the County and has done his utmost to keep an open mind and do what is in the best interest of us all. I am responsible for County employees, and I wish we could get the respect we so deserve, he said. I am tired of trying to do what is best for the County and not getting the same cooperation back, he stated. At times, I know some of the work should be contracted out, but I should be talked to when issues like this come up, he added.

WHEREAS, Saratoga County's local share of Medicaid has increased over 14% over three years, and Medicaid costs account for more than 11% of our operating budget and are the single largest budget item for Saratoga County; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors opposes any shift of costs to our taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, in increase in FMAP and IGT program funds could be applied to reduce the rising deficit (in 2008, \$8.3 Million) of Maplewood Manor; and

WHEREAS, mental health care dollars need not be allocated based on number of beds but should be used as needed to provide services necessary in our municipalities for any combination of inpatient and outpatient services; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors expresses it support for equal access to quality, safe, affordable healthcare for all so individuals can live out their lives with dignity, and calls upon state and federal legislators to make healthcare reform a priority; and be it further

WHEREAS, it is reported that closing the New York State Tree Nursery is being considered as part of the budget cutting that is necessary to reduce the deficit in the state budget; and

WHEREAS, the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors appreciates the necessity to reduce the budget and that certain services must be reduced, but questions the efficiency of choosing the nursery as a means of reducing state costs; and

WHEREAS the Nursery occupies 250 acres of land adjacent to the Saratoga State Park and produces more than a million seedlings of multiple varieties of trees for use on state grounds and for sale; and

WHEREAS, the state nursery program has existed since 1902, and the Saratoga Tree Nursery is the last existing nursery, having produced over 1.6 billion seedlings to enhance and protect the forest resources of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, the Nursery also conducts research, and sponsors an educational School Seeding Program for schools at all levels throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, the Nursery furnishes quality seedlings to private landowners at low cost for small reforestation projects which enhance the environmental quality of life throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, these services are rendered by a staff of 10 full time and three dozen seasonal workers, with a budget of only \$750,000 which is offset in part by tree sales of about \$250,000; and

WHEREAS, a more efficient way to address the budgeting impact of the Saratoga Tree Nursery on the state budget would be to address the business plan of the facility to make it more self supporting; and

WHEREAS, the cost to the state of obtaining trees from other sources for use on state facilities by closing the Nursery could be in excess of any amounts saved by closing the Nursery; and

WHEREAS, the loss of this environmentally friendly, aesthetically pleasing facility, with its positive economic impact on the Saratoga County community, represents a cost to New York State that far exceeds any budget reducing benefit achieved by its closing; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that this Board of Supervisors expresses its strong support for the continued operation of the New York State Tree Nursery in Saratoga County and recommends that, instead of closing the Nursery, changes in the operation of the Nursery be formulated to make it more financially self supporting; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the above Project; and it is hereby further

RESOLVED, that the Saratoga County agrees to advance the Project through; Saratoga County's resources and agrees that the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes Saratoga County to pay in the first instance the full federal costs and full non-federal costs of any and all phase(s) or portions thereof and hereby appropriates from its General Fund the funds necessary to complete the Project including all phase(s) or portions thereof, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors makes a 100% commitment of the non-federal share (if any) of the costs of Construction/Construction Inspection phase(s) of work for the Project or portions thereof, with the federal share of such costs to be applied directly by the New York State Department of Transportation (hereinafter "NYSDOT") pursuant to the State/Local Agreement and it is hereby further

RESOLVED, that the sum of \$1,686,589.00 (One million six hundred eighty six thousand five hundred eighty nine dollars and no cents) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund and made available to cover the cost of participation in the above phase(s) of the Project; and hereby appropriates from the General Fund the funds necessary to complete the Project including all phase(s) or portions thereof; and it is further

RESOLVED, that upon completion of construction of the Project, or a fully usable portion thereof, Saratoga County agrees to maintain the Project, or fully usable portion thereof, at their sole cost and expense; and it is hereby further

RESOLVED, that in the event the full federal and non-federal share of the Project exceeds the amount appropriated above, the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors shall convene as soon as possible to appropriate said excess amount immediately; and it is hereby further

RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Saratoga is hereby authorized to execute all necessary Agreements or certifications on behalf of Saratoga County, (subject to the County Attorney's approval as to form and content), with NYSDOT in connection with the advancement, approval and completion of the Project identified in the State/Local Agreement; and providing for the administration of the Project and the municipality's first instance funding of non-federal share of project costs and permanent funding of the local share of federal-aid and state-aid eligible Project costs and all Project costs within appropriations therefore that are not so eligible, and it is further

RESOLVED, that a certified copy of this Resolution be filed with the New York State Commissioner of the Department of Transportation by attaching it to any necessary Agreement in connection with the Project; and it is further
