Approving the 2014 Tax Bill Flyer, pursuant to Local Law Introductory No. 1, Print No. 1 of 2012, establishing Truth in Taxation in Saratoga County.

Board called to order by the Chairman Grattidge.

## PRESENTATIONS:

Mrs. Johnson asked the members of the Veterans Committee to join her at the podium. She said in recognition of the military personnel that served in the Korean and Vietnam wars the Veterans Committee purchased commemorative flags for each town and city. She asks that these flags be flown from June 28<sup>th</sup> to July 27<sup>th</sup> for the Korean War and from March 31<sup>st</sup> to April 30<sup>th</sup> for the Vietnam War. She asked the Committee members to show the flags and then presented the Chairman of the Board with these flags for the County.

Mr. Grattidge asked Mr. Wood to come to the podium and dedicate his 2011/2012 Board Proceedings. Mr. Wood asked his wife, Ronnie, to join him. He dedicated his proceedings to his wife Ronnie, the entire Board of Supervisors, County Administrator Spencer Hellwig and Clerk of the Board Pam Hargrave.

Mr. Rowland read and presented a proclamation to Suzzanne Pratt and Randy Hadley from the Department of Social Services for their recent recognition from the State.

Mr. Grattidge said that as Chair of the Saratoga Casino and Raceway Foundation, it was his honor today to present awards totaling \$28,204 to 23 very deserving organizations. Over the nine years the Foundation has been in existence, we have made over \$267,000 in grants to 152 not-for-profit entities in Saratoga County. The Foundation is funded entirely by donations from Saratoga Casino and Raceway and the Saratoga Harness Horsepersons Association. The purpose of the Foundation is for the support of charitable and public benefit organizations whose mission is the betterment of the quality of life, health and welfare of the residents of Saratoga County. He thanked the members of the Board for their work over the last year in shaping the Foundation and utilizing the financial resources wisely based on the large number of requests received each year. Other members of the Board are Scott Johnson, Mayor of the City of Saratoga Springs; City of Saratoga Springs Supervisor Matt Veitch; SHHA President Barry Segel; Saratoga Casino and Raceway Vice President of External Affairs Skip Carlson; and Diane Armer who serves as secretary to the Foundation. ## PUBLIC INPUT:

Bill Goslin, Town of Ballston, RE: Water – Mr. Goslin said thanked the Board for the opportunity to speak and told the Board that he is a Town Board member in the Town of Ballston and the remarks that he will make today are personal and not necessarily representative of the Board. In 2011 he came to the Board to discuss concerns about the quality of Saratoga County Water. The solution he received was the length of the pipeline and that flushing the system and adjusting the chemicals would resolve the issues. He said he is back today to again discuss concerns. The problems have not been solved and have gotten worse. He said he went to the Water Authority meeting and heard they had 8 solutions. Saratoga County has serious problems with the facility and with the water. It is his opinion that the Town of Ballston should no longer take water from the county until these issues are cleared up.

# CORRECTING 2013 TAX BILL AND AUTHORIZING A TAX CREDIT

WHEREAS, Real Property Tax Law §554 provides the procedure for the correction of errors on the tax rolls, and Real Property Tax Law §556 authorizes the provision of a credit against outstanding tax owed on a corrected tax bill; and

WHEREAS, Real Property Tax Law §550 (2)(c) defines a "clerical error" as an incorrect entry of assessed valuation on an assessment roll or on a tax roll for a parcel which, except for a failure on the part of the assessor to act on a partial exemption, would be eligible for such partial exemption; and

WHEREAS, the owner of the following property has timely submitted proof of an error in her 2013 tax bill, to wit: that the parcel was incorrectly assessed without the basic STAR exemption to which the owner was entitled; and

WHEREAS, our Director of Real Property Tax Services recommends that the error be corrected and a credit be authorized; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the application of the following individual for correction of the 2013 tax rolls be approved, and the tax rolls are so corrected:

## **RESOLUTION 202 - 13**

AUTHORIZING THE DELETION FROM THE TAX ROLLS OF PARCELS LOCATED IN THE TOWNS OF BALLSTON, CLIFTON PARK, GREENFIELD, MILTON, MOREAU, NORTHUMBERLAND, WATERFORD AND WILTON AND THE CITIES OF MECHANICVILLE AND SARATOGA SPRINGS,

AND A REFUND OF 2011, 2012 AND 2013 TAXES IN THE AMOUNT OF \$52,974.92 FOR SAID PARCELS

WHEREAS, Real Property Tax Law §554 provides the procedure for the correction of errors on the tax rolls that are due to an unlawful entry on an assessment roll or tax roll; and

WHEREAS, Real Property Tax Law §556 imposes an obligation on the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors to entertain applications for refunds of real property taxes and determine whether a refund is owed to the applicant due to an unlawfully entry on an assessment roll or a tax roll; and

WHERESAS, the owner of the following properties, Level 3 Communications, LLC, has timely submitted proof of errors in its 2011, 2012 and 2013 tax bills, to wit: The decision of the Appellate Division of the New York State Supreme Court, First Department, on May 3, 2012, in the Matter of RCN N.Y. Communications, LLC v. Tax Commission of the City of New York, held that fiber optic cables, such as those owned by Level 3 Communications, LLC, are personal property, and not real property as real property is defined in Real Property Tax Law §102(12), because fiber optic cables are not electrical conductors, but rather are electrical insulators, and therefore cannot be assessed pursuant to Real Property Tax Law §102(12). The assessment of fiber optic cables as real property was therefore an unlawful entry as defined in Real Property Tax Law §550(7)(c) because an assessor has no authority to assess personal property; and

WHEREAS, our Director of Real Property Tax Services and the County Attorney has recommended that the errors be corrected and a tax refund be authorized; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the application of the property owner Level 3 Communications, LLC for correction of the 2011, 2012 and 2013 tax rolls be approved, and the tax rolls are so corrected to delete all taxes owed on the parcels listed below; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the County Treasurer refund the following overpayment of County, City and/or Town taxes in the amount of \$52,974.92 to the property owner Level 3 Communications, LLC:

AUTHORIZING A REFUND OF PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES TO THE CITY OF MECHANICVILLE AND TOWN OF STILLWATER INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY

WHEREAS, in 1999, CMD Realty, LLC entered into a Payment in Lieu of Tax (PILOT) agreement with the City of Mechanicville and Town of Stillwater Industrial Development Agency (IDA) for a term of ten years relative to the development of a warehouse and distribution center on Tax Parcel #262.-1-4.14 and Tax Parcel #262.-1-4.121 in the Town of Stillwater; and

WHEREAS, at the conclusion of said ten year PILOT agreement in 2009, the IDA mistakenly continued to invoice CMD Realty, LLC for PILOT payments, despite the fact that said Tax Parcels had returned to the tax rolls; and

WHEREAS, CMD Realty, LLC's tenant, DeCrescente Distributing Co., Inc., paid to the IDA the PILOT invoices submitted to CMD Realty, LLC for the years 2009, 2010, 2011, and 2012, which payments the IDA proportionately distributed to the County of Saratoga, the Town of Stillwater, the City of Mechanicville, and Mechanicville Central School District; and

WHEREAS, CMD Realty, LLC also paid the County, Town, City and School real property tax bills submitted to it for the years 2009-2012; and

WHEREAS, the IDA has made an application to the County Treasurer for a refund of the amount of the PILOT payments mistakenly paid by the IDA to the County for the years 2009-2012 in the amount of \$8,240.44; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Saratoga County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to refund the amount of \$8,240.44 to the City of Mechanicville and Town of Stillwater Industrial Development Agency (IDA) for the County's share of PILOT payments mistakenly paid in error by the IDA to the County of Saratoga relative to Tax Parcels #262.-1-4.14 and #262.-1-121 in the Town of Stillwater.

# AUTHORIZING 5-YEAR LEASE WITH CITY OF SARATOGA SPRINGS FOR SUPREME COURT LAW LIBRARY

WHEREAS, Judiciary Law §813 obligates each County to maintain a Supreme Court Library within the County; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 216 - 2008 authorized the current lease of library facilities expiring December 31, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the City of Saratoga Springs has offered to renew the lease through December 31, 2018 on similar terms; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Board of Supervisors is hereby authorized and directed to execute a lease with the City of Saratoga Springs for its provision of 2403 square feet of space on the third floor of City Hall for use as a State Supreme Court Library for the period: January 1, 2014 - December 31, 2018 at the following annual rentals:

2014 \$35,522.28 2015 \$36,232.73 2016 \$36,957.38 2017 \$37,696.53 2018 \$38,450.46;

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that said lease shall also provide that the County of Saratoga shall have the right to terminate the lease subject to its provision of prior notice of at least six (6) months; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that said lease shall be subject to renewal for an additional period of five years upon the mutual written agreement of the County and City, and upon such terms as shall be mutually agreed upon by the County and City in a written lease renewal; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that all other terms and conditions of said lease shall be identical to the existing lease.

<u>BUDGET IMPACT STATEMENT</u>: Funding for this agreement is included in the 2014 Tentative Budget.

## RESOLUTION 205 - 13

Introduced by the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the Public Safety Committee

INTRODUCING A PROPOSED LOCAL LAW IDENTIFIED AS INTRODUCTORY NO. 2, PRINT NO. 1 OF 2013 PROHIBITING ENTRY INTO OR REMAINING IN COUNTY BUILDINGS BY PERSONS IN PHYSICAL POSSESSION OF A DEADLY WEAPON OR DANGEROUS INSTRUMENT, AND SETTING A PUBLIC HEARING THEREON

WHEREAS, deadly weapons and dangerous instruments often cause accidental deaths and injuries, and are frequently used in the commission of crimes, particularly homicides and assaults; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors believes that the physical possession of deadly weapons and dangerous instruments in County buildings by persons other than those on official business with authorization to carry such weapons or instruments poses a serious threat to the health, safety and general welfare of County public servants and other persons lawfully in County buildings; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors further believes that the presence of deadly weapons and dangerous instruments in County buildings, except by certain authorized officials, may seriously impair the performance of essential government functions by way of threat or intimidation to County public servants and others; and

URGING THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY TO SEEK MODIFICATION OF THE FLOOD INSURANCE PROVISIONS OF THE BIGGERT-WATERS FLOOD INSURANCE REFORM ACT AND TO MAKE ADDITIONAL REFORMS TO THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM IN ORDER TO PROVIDE RELIEF TO RESIDENTS OF THE VILLAGE OF WATERFORD AND OTHER COUNTY WATERFRONT RESIDENTS

WHEREAS, the Village of Waterford is located at the confluence of the Hudson and Mohawk Rivers; and WHEREAS, Village homes located along the waterfront and many Village homes located within the 100 Year Floodplain are susceptible to annual flooding; and

WHEREAS, many properties along the waterfront and within the flood plain in the Village sustained severe damage due to Hurricane Irene in 2011; and

WHEREAS, in July 2012, the federal government enacted the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012 (BW-12) which calls on the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and other agencies to make a number of changes in the way the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) is administered; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the passage of BW-12, several waterfront and/or flood plain properties in the Village of Waterford have been subject to dramatic increases in their annual flood insurance premiums, which premiums are now between \$5,000 to \$9,000 per year; and

WHEREAS, homeowners subject to these significant increases in their flood insurance premiums are having great difficulty affording the new premiums, while others are experiencing problems selling their homes because prospective purchasers are unable to afford the increased flood insurance premiums; and

WHEREAS, over 320 properties out of a total of 664 properties in the Village of Waterford are listed as being located within the 100 Year Floodplain; and

WHEREAS, one thing that controls flood insurance premiums is the Basic Flood Elevation (BFE), which in the Village of Waterford is established at 34 feet; and

WHEREAS, the worst flood of record in the Village occurred in 1913 when the river rose to 29.70 feet; which flood pre-dated the construction of the Sacandaga reservoir dam; and

WHEREAS, while efforts to re-map the BFE in the Town and Village of Waterford are underway, NYS Department of Environmental Conservation officials do not anticipate that new BFE mapping will be complete for at least two years due to FEMA's experiencing a shortage of funding for this project; and

WHEREAS, the increase in flood insurance premiums resulting from the enactment of BF-12 and the inability to lower the BFE in the Village of Waterford for at least two years is having a devastating effect on Village residents, as long-time residents are being forced from their homes, others are unable to sell their home, some properties may go into foreclosure while other properties may be abandoned, and Village real estate values are likely to plummet; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors believes that FEMA must take appropriate action to prevent the disastrous consequences resulting from the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors hereby urges the Federal Emergency Management Agency to seek appropriate revisions to the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Act of 2012 to reduce the significant increase in flood insurance premiums charged to property owners in the Village of Waterford and Saratoga County residing in waterfront properties and/or within the 100 Year Flood Plain; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Board of Supervisors further urges FEMA to obtain appropriate funding to complete the re-mapping of the Basic Flood Elevation as expeditiously as possible in order to prevent Village of Waterford and Saratoga County homeowners residing within the 100 Year Flood Plain from losing their homes; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Board shall forward a certified copy of this Resolution to the Administrator of FEMA, U.S. Senator Charles Schumer, US Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, Governor Andrew M. Cuomo and Village of Waterford Mayor J. Bert Mahoney.

WHEREAS, despite the 2010 expansion of Saratoga County Sewer District No. 1's Wastewater Treatment Plant, Sewer District officials are concerned that anticipated residential and commercial growth resulting from the expansion of the Global Foundries chip manufacturing plant and the further development of the Luther Forest Technology Campus could result in the Sewer District's collection system reaching capacity within ten vears or less: and

WHEREAS, the Saratoga County Sewer District Commission solicited and entertained proposals for an engineering study evaluating the Sewer District's existing collection system infrastructure, including the Saratoga Springs pump station, future capacity issues resulting from anticipated growth in the County, and the need for, sizing, timing of construction, and capital costs associated with the construction of a second wastewater treatment plant; and

WHEREAS, the Saratoga County Sewer District Commission and the Sewer District's Executive Director have recommended that a contract for such engineering study be awarded to the team of O'Brien & Gere and Barton & Loguidice, P.C.; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Board is authorized to execute a contract with O'Brien & Gere and Barton & Loguidice, P.C. to conduct an engineering study evaluating Saratoga County Sewer District No. 1's collection system infrastructure, including the Saratoga Springs pump station; the ability of existing infrastructure to handle future capacity needs; and the potential need for, sizing, timing of construction, and capital costs associated with the construction of a second wastewater treatment plant, with such professional services to be provided at a cost not to exceed \$85,000; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the form and content of such agreement shall be subject to the approval of the County Attorney; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the 2013 Saratoga County Budget is amended as follows:

## OPPOSING THE CLOSURE OF THE MT. MCGREGOR CORRECTIONAL FACILITY

WHEREAS, the New York State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision has announced its intention of closing its medium security facility at Mount McGregor in the Town of Wilton in July 2014; and

WHEREAS, since 1976 the prison facility has furnished employment to Saratoga County residents; and

WHEREAS, the closing of this medium security facility will cause the loss of more than 320 jobs, many held by Wilton residents; and

WHEREAS, this ill-advised decision will not result in the savings which are being discussed, but will end up being more costly in the long run; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections has failed to put forth either a plan to account for the parole or relocation of the inmates, or a plan for the transfer or retraining of current employees; and

WHEREAS, the premature parole of inmates by the Department of Corrections could pose a safety risk to our local communities;

WHEREAS, the Department's plan to close the Mt. McGregor Correctional Facility fails to appropriately account for the financial needs of its host community, the Town of Wilton; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors hereby strongly opposes the closure of the medium security correctional facility at Mt. McGregor in the Town of Wilton, and urges the New York State Department of Corrections to reconsider its decision; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors forward a certified copy of this Resolution to Acting Commissioner of the New York State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision Anthony J. Annucci, Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, State Senator Kathleen A. Marchione, Senator Hugh Farley, Senator Charles Schumer, Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, Congressman Paul Tonko, Congressman Bill Owens, Assemblyman Tony Jordan, Assemblyman James N. Tedisco, Assemblyman Dan Stec, Assemblyman John McDonald, Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, Senator Dean Skelos and Senator Jeff Klein.

AUTHORIZING AN AMENDED AGREEMENT WITH INFO QUICK SOLUTIONS, INC. TO PROVIDE AUTOMATED INDEXING SERVICES FOR CRIMINAL COURT RECORDS MAINTAINED BY THE COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE

WHEREAS, Resolution 178-11 authorized a five year agreement with Info Quick Solutions, Inc. (IQS) to provide hardware and software system upgrades, installation, technical support, maintenance and verification services for the purposes of digitizing and indexing records in the County Clerk's Office, said agreement commencing on November 7, 2011, and at a cost not to exceed \$16,095 per month; and

WHEREAS, earlier this year the Saratoga County Court delivered to the County Clerk's office records of criminal cases that had previously been maintained by the County Court; and

WHEREAS, said criminal records are voluminous, involving a large number of cases; and

WHEREAS, the indexing of these criminal records in the County Clerk's Office would take a significant amount of labor to index manually; and

WHEREAS, IQS has proposed utilizing its automatic indexing process to index said criminal records at a cost of \$875 per year; and

WHEREAS, our County Clerk has recommended that the County's contract with IQS be amended to include the provision of automatic indexing services for those criminal records previously maintained by the Saratoga County Court, at a cost not to exceed \$875 per year; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Board is authorized to execute an amendment to the agreement with Info Quick Solutions, Inc. of Liverpool, New York, to provide for the automated indexing in the Saratoga County Clerk's Office of criminal court records previously maintained by the Saratoga County Court, at a cost not to exceed \$875 per year through November 7, 2016; with the form and substance of such amendment to be subject to the approval of the County Attorney.

BUDGET IMPACT STATEMENT: None. Funding is available in the 2013 County Budget.

WHEREAS, Section 3 of Local Law No. 1 of 2012 further requires this Board of Supervisors to annually approve the contents of said Tax Bill Flyer at the Board's regular meeting during the month of November, and to authorize by resolution the manner by which said Tax Bill Flyer will be disseminated to Saratoga County property owners and the public; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator and County Director of Real Property Tax Services have submitted to this Board for approval the Tax Bill Flyer for 2014 attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, our Law and Finance Committee has recommended the approval of the attached 2014 Tax Bill Flyer; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, in accordance with Local Law No. 1 of 2012, this Board of Supervisors hereby approves the 2014 Tax Bill Flyer attached hereto as Exhibit A; and be it further

RESOLVED, that said 2014 Tax Bill Flyer shall be included as an enclosure with each 2014 Saratoga County property tax bill when mailed, and shall be posted on the County of Saratoga's website at <a href="https://www.saratogacountyny.gov">www.saratogacountyny.gov</a> by no later than January 1, 2014.

## EXHIBIT A - YOUR PROPERTY TAXES..

The Saratoga County Board of Supervisors is providing this information to all property taxpayers in Saratoga County to inform them about how State & Federal mandates affect their annual property tax bills.

The 2014 County General Fund Budget totals \$237,861,388. Of that amount, \$94,891,146 is for programs mandated by New York State Government with a net cost of \$62,060,020 to the taxpayers of Saratoga County. County government has little or no control over these costs.

'Mandates" are federal or State created programs that are required to be operated by lower level governments. In New York State, most of these mandates are not accompanied by State money to pay for them or are only partially paid for. Because County government relies upon property taxes to operate, expensive State mandates become expensive property taxes on local taxpayers.

In 2014, these Unfunded Mandates will exceed the \$52,454,505 Property Tax Levy by \$9,605,515. This means that all County property taxes plus an additional \$9.6 Million from sales tax revenues are needed to cover the State mandates.

Mr. Grattidge thanked Supervisor George Hargrave as this is his last meeting as County Supervisor representing Galway and wanted to take this opportunity to thank him for all his services and asked for a round of support.

Mr. Hargrave said he has had twelve years on the Board and hopes he has made some friends. He considers the Board his family.

Mr. Veitch wanted to make an announcement about a resident from the City of Saratoga Springs who passed away, Kyle York. He was someone who came to this Board from time to time to speak on many issues. Although they may not have agreed on these issues, Mr. Veitch wanted to recognize his participation in the process as it is rare to find someone in your community who takes the time to get involved. Mr. Veitch said he did see him on Election Day and he was thankful for that.

Mrs. Southworth said in regards to the comments made today during the public input the averages for the water are done quarterly and are a rolling average. There is no way to definitely say we were over or under for any length of time. She doesn't want the public to think that they were exposed over a long period of time. Although she did agree with shutting off the water she wants the people to think that definitely know that they were exposed to lead or byproducts over long periods. We do know that this was the first instance in increases in lead and we know that comes with changes in water ph and the Water Authority is doing everything they can at this point to come up with a solution, although it is going to be a while, because of the design not because of the individuals that work at the Water Authority or sitting on the Water Authority Board. She doesn't want the public to be alarmed.

Mrs. Southworth thanked Supervisor Mary Ann Johnson for her leadership on the Veterans Committee and all she has done for the Veterans 5K Run. She said the Veterans in this County will miss her dedication at this level.

Mr. Rowland introduced the Supervisor-elect, Paul Lundy, from the Town of Greenfield. Mr. Grattidge said in keeping with that spirit, he introduced the Supervisor-elect from the Town of Ballston, Pat Ziegler.

Mr. Sausville said the water is a complicated issue and the authority is looking at the various alternatives. He said the water is safe to drink and that is important to keep in mind. He doesn't want people walking away from the meeting today with the assumption that the water is not safe because it is safe.

Mr. Grattidge wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving.
