# **Dear County Leaders**

Thank you for your ongoing partnership with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) as we work to protect and steward our natural resources. I write to you today with exciting news on a new deer hunting opportunity that was included in the 2021-2022 New York State Budget that will provide new economic opportunities to your local hunting economies.

In upstate counties that choose to participate, youth hunters aged 12-13 will now be allowed to hunt deer with a firearm or crossbow under the supervision of an experienced adult hunter. Currently, young hunters that are 12 or13 years old can already hunt big game using archery equipment and can hunt small game with a firearm. However, until now, New York had been the only state to not allow these young hunters to hunt big game with a firearm.

Deer hunting is a valued tradition for many upstate families, providing quality food to New Yorkers and reducing the negative impacts of overabundant deer populations on agriculture, forests, and communities. Expanding youth hunting opportunities to assist with deer management and cultivating a new generation of hunters is a top priority for DEC, and we look forward to working with you to realize and capitalize on this new opportunity included in the State Budget.

The program as enacted by the legislature is treated as a pilot for upstate counties through 2023. Specifically, the new law (Environmental Conservation Law Section11-0935):

- allows 12-13 year old licensed hunters to hunt deer with a rifle, shotgun, or muzzleloading firearm in areas where and during the hunting seasons in which such firearms may be used;
- allows 12-13 year old licensed hunters to hunt deer with a crossbow during the times when other hunters may use crossbows;
- maintains existing youth hunting safety requirements, including:
  - supervision by an experienced and licensed adult hunter who maintains physical control over the youth hunter at all times,
  - requires the youth hunter and adult mentor wear fluorescent orange or pink clothing, and
  - o requires both the youth hunter and adult mentor to remain at ground level while hunting deer with a crossbow, rifle, shotgun, or muzzleloader.

**Most importantly, the legislation requires each county to "opt-in".** Counties comprising New York City, Westchester, Nassau, and Suffolk are specifically excluded from participation by the legislature.



In accordance with the requirements of the new law (legislation enclosed), DEC encourages your county to consider passage of a local law opting into the new hunting pilot for 12-13 year-old hunters. If such local legislation is in place and DEC is notified by June 1, we will be able to publish it in our annual hunting and trapping regulations guide. However, as long as your county adopts a local law to opt-in to the program and informs DEC by September 1, we will provide this information for hunters on DEC's website leading into the 2021 big game seasons.

I hope that your county will strongly consider "opting-in" to this exciting new opportunity to support our young hunters. # Testimony Given by Jason Kemper, Chairman, NYS Conservation Fund Advisory Board

Good morning. On behalf of the Conservation Fund Advisory Board and the sporting community in NYS, thank you for allowing me to testify in relation to the 2021-2022 State Budget. The Conservation Fund Advisory Board (CFAB), as spelled out in the State Finance Law (Section 83 Conservation Fund) and ECL (Section 11-0327) is charged with ensuring that the money in the Conservation Fund is spent specifically for the care, management, protection, and enlargement of the fish and game resources of the State and the promotion of public fishing, hunting, and trapping. The main source of revenue for the Conservation Fund is the sale of hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses.

The sale of these licenses in New York generates approximately \$46 million dollars per year and leverages another \$25 million in federal aid. The Conservation Fund directly funds 240 individuals in the NYSDEC and another 65 positions in the Department are funded from the federal aid associated with sporting license sales.

According to a 2011 study performed by the United States Fish Wildlife Service, the New York sporting community spends approximately \$4.95 billion per year pursing their activities. This ranked #2 in the nation. Those sporting activities supported approximately 56,000 jobs in New York State (#5 in the nation) and generated over \$623 million in state and local taxes.

Through the American System of Conservation Funding, sportsmen and women contribute immensely to conservation efforts. This "user pays, public benefit"- model essentially provides a vast majority of the funding for state fish and wildlife agencies. This system allows for the proper management and conservation of the state's resources while providing benefits for the public at large, not just the sporting community.

I think we can all agree that 2020 was certainly an unprecedented year and there was, therefore, a significant boom in all forms of outdoor recreation. This boost was also evident in the sporting community. All categories of license sales showed increases during the 2020 calendar year. However, more importantly is the dramatic increase in requests for Hunter Education Courses, because these courses are mandatory for all individuals prior to their first purchase of a hunting license.

In 2020, there were 69,264 individuals who completed the hunter education certificate program. And additionally, 50,736 individuals have signed up for the course and are in the process of completing the requirements. To put this into perspective prior to 2020, approximately 25,000 individuals completed the hunter education program on a yearly basis. This is an astonishing 176 % increase in individuals completing the course in 2020. A large percentage of those completing the 2020 program include youth between 11-13 years of age, as well as a large percentage of female participation. In addition, there is increased participation from urban and suburban areas.

# **Universal Hunting Age of 12**

The need to keep the Conservation Fund solvent and also to recruit younger people into the sporting community is crucial. Currently, 12 and 13 -year olds with adult supervision can only pursue small game in New York State, while 14 and 15- year olds are allowed to pursue big game under adult supervision. CFAB strongly supports the Executive Budget proposal of instituting a minimum Universal Hunting Age of 12 which will allow 12 and 13 - year olds under adult supervision to pursue big game. As previously stated, 12 and 13- year olds can already pursue small game, but the new provision will simply allow them to legally pursue big game in New York State.

At this time the average age of a sporting license buyer in New York is over 50 years of age. The Executive Budget proposal to allow the same hunting rules for all hunters aged 12 through 15 years with adult supervision would recruit a younger group of sporting license buyers. Every other state in the nation allows a person 12 years of age, or younger, this full range of hunting opportunities. Because of this, New York loses out on the economic benefits from this activity as older hunters looking to take their young people on a hunting vacation are unable to consider New York if their child's age is younger than 14. In addition, surrounding states are getting the local tourism revenue and license sales revenue associated with New York's youth and family leaving the state to pursue big game opportunities where they are legally allowed to do so. Attached to this testimony is a chart prepared by the New York Sportsman's Advisory Council illustrating the big game age restrictions by state.

The universal hunting age of 12 was supported in the 2012-2016 NYS Deer Management Plan and is a recommendation in the Draft 2021-2025 NYS Deer Management Plan that was released in December and is currently in the public review phase.

Hunting provides quality time for parents to bond with their children and other family members in an outdoor setting. These are excellent opportunities to introduce youth to nature, conservation, and responsible wildlife management. Hunting, especially at an early age, imprints in youth the mindset that game management and environmental stewardship go hand and hand. Statistics have proven that youth hunters, under the supervision of an adult, are the safest hunters afield. Starting youth at a young age with a mentor results in an increased long-term retention rate and has proven to make them safer and more responsible hunters when they are old enough to hunt on their own.

CFAB believes that the future of hunting in New York State, as well as the conservation and sustainability of our natural resources, is directly tied to the recruitment and retention of our youth. Allowing 12 year olds the legal opportunity to partake in all New York hunting opportunities will have a positive impact on hunter safety, family recreation, local and statewide economies, and the Conservation Fund.

# **Full Inclusion of Crossbow**

CFAB supports the Executive Budget Proposal for full inclusion of crossbow use during all big game seasons. Currently, crossbow use is limited to a portion of the regular and bowhunting big game seasons in New York State.

Limited crossbow use was implemented as part of the 2014-15 State Budget. The current law requires that individuals possess a muzzleloader privilege in order to use the crossbow during allowable seasons. The Executive Budget proposal seeks to classify the crossbow as archery equipment and require a license holder to purchase a bowhunter privilege in order to utilize a crossbow.

Each year since the crossbow use was legalized there has been a steady increase in the number of deer harvested using the crossbows. The continued expansion of crossbow use is an important deer management tool, especially in urban settings. In addition, the full inclusion of crossbows will increase license sales as well as provide additional opportunities to all ability levels of sportsmen and sportswomen.

The use of crossbows for all hunting seasons is supported in the 2012-2016 NYS Deer Management Plan and is a recommendation in the Draft 2021-2025 NYS Deer Management Plan that was released in December and is currently in the public review phase.

In addition, as is the case with youth hunting opportunities, many neighboring states have provide crossbow opportunities that are more inclusive than New York State.

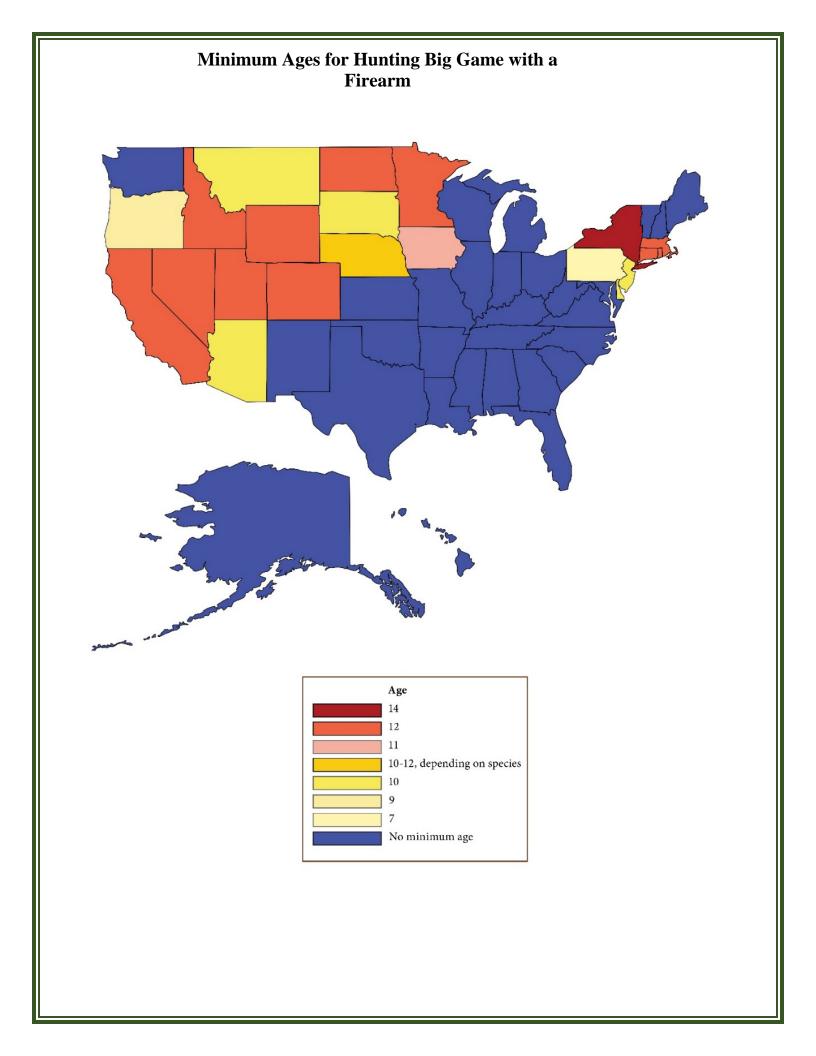
Aside from the items explained in detail above the Conservation Fund Advisory Board fully supports the additional items outlined in the Executive Budget Proposal. This support includes increased investment opportunities for the Lifetime License Trust Account, improving the provisions for youth utilizing treestands with an adult, and the proposed investments in infrastructure being proposed in the New York Works Program.

In conclusion, I would like to state the Executive Budget proposal to increase opportunities for 12 and 13-year old youth and increasing the opportunities for the sporting community will have an immediate positive impact on the Conservation Fund. However, these proposals go further than that. The sale of hunting, fishing and trapping licenses fund a significant amount of staff and management for all species of plants and animals. In essence, the sporting community pays for management of species that they will never pursue. Furthermore, the more solvent the Conservation Fund is the less dependent this species management is on the NYS General Fund. As we approach unprecedented financial uncertainty ahead, this is more important than ever.

Thank you for your time, I look forward to working with legislature on items relating to the sporting community.

### **RESOLUTION 73 - 2018**

AUTHORIZING THE CHAIRMAN TO ENTER INTO AN AMENDMENT TO THE AGREEMENT WITH TYLER TECHNOLOGIES, INC. FOR THE PURCHASE OF ADDITIONAL SOFTWARE MODULES FOR THE COUNTY'S NEW INTEGRATED FINANCIAL SERVICES SOFTWARE SYSTEM, AND AMENDING THE 2017 COUNTY BUDGET IN RELATION THERETO

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 212-2016, this Board authorized an amendment to its agreement with Tyler Technologies, Inc. to provide for the installation and maintenance of a new financial services software system, and the provision of related professional services to include project management, implementation, maintenance, tech support and training, at a cost not to exceed \$450,000; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to purchase additional hardware, including printers and scanners, as well as software modules for the new financial management software system being designed and constructed in order to improve management of County inventory, access financial, billing and payroll forms, and improve management of financial content; and

WHEREAS, Tyler Technologies, Inc. has provided a quote to the County for the software modules requested and related fees in the amount of \$147,442; and for travel expenses in the amount of \$8,000; totaling in all \$155,442; and

Arcadis of New York, Inc. (Arcadis) has prepared this letter proposal to for Saratoga County Sewer District's consideration to commence the conceptual engineering and economic analysis of several viable alternatives to handle and reduce sludge volumes on site. This work will expand upon the previous studies conducted for SCSD with updated sludge loadings and be oriented to position SCSD for financing and grant funding in 2022. It is anticipated a second amendment will be required to properly change the scope and compensation for the recommended alternative.

# **Scope of Services**

# Task 8 SCSD Conceptual Design

# Subtask 8.1 Project Management

Arcadis will provide project management for this task by communicating weekly with SCSD pertaining to data needs, progress, decisions required to meet the schedule.

# Subtask 8.2 Review Flows and Loads

Arcadis will review five years of influent and effluent data on discharge monitoring reports as well monthly operating reports prepared by SCSD, as well as other available data requested by Arcadis and provided by SCSD. Arcadis will present the review of the data to SCSD in a virtual workshop to develop consensus on the projected primary and waste activated sludge (WAS). The data will be utilized to inform subtasks 8.3 and 8.4.

### Subtask 8.3 Develop Energy and Solids Flow Model

Arcadis will revise the energy and solids flow model developed for the Regional Biosolids Facility and utilize the design flows and loads developed under subtask 8.2. The model will be updated for the SCSD wastewater treatment plant, revised capital costs or various unit operations, building requirements, site work and appropriate non construction markups, as well as operational and maintenance (O&M) costs. The alternatives for biosolids handling and treatment include the following:

 No Action – Hauling Unstabilized Sludge Arcadis will assess the required upgrades to thicken, dewater, haul, and dispose of unstabilized sludge offsite for future 2052 conditions for a baseline comparison of costs and GHG emissions with the other alternatives.

- Thermal Drying Unstabilized Sludge (Class A) Arcadis will assess the required upgrades to thicken,
  dewater and thermally dry unstabilized sludge to 90% TS to meet the required pathogen and vector
  reduction requirements and produce Class A biosolids. Please note that unstabilized thermally dried
  Class A biosolids have been found to less desirable than stabilized thermally dried Class A biosolids due
  to odors released when the biosolids are rewet. Arcadis will assess dewatering options of belt filter
  presses (BFPs) and centrifuges.
- Anaerobic Digestion with Biogas Utilization (Class B) Arcadis will assess the required upgrades to
  thicken, anaerobically digest and dewater biosolids to produce Class B biosolids. Arcadis will assess
  dewatering options of BFPs and centrifuges. Arcadis will assess the utilization of biogas to fuel a
  combined heat and power (CHP) system or renewable natural gas system (RNG).
- Anaerobic Digestion with Biogas Utilization and Thermal Drying (Class A) Arcadis will assess the
  required upgrades to thicken, anaerobically digest, dewater and thermally dry stabilized sludge to
  produce Class A biosolids. Arcadis will assess dewatering options of BFPs and centrifuges. Arcadis will
  assess the reuse of waste heat from the CHP to heat the digesters and preheat intake air to the thermal
  dryer.
- Anaerobic Digestion with Biogas Utilization and Lystek (Class A) Arcadis will assess the required
  upgrades to thicken, anaerobically digest and utilize a proprietary process by Lystek to produce Class A
  biosolids by a chemical hydrolysis process after digestion. Arcadis will assess the utilization of biogas to
  fuel a combined heat and power (CHP) system or renewable natural gas system (RNG).
- Lystek (Class A) Arcadis will assess the required upgrades to thicken and utilize a proprietary process
  by Lystek to produce Class A biosolids by a chemical hydrolysis process. Arcadis will assess the
  utilization of the product as a substitute as a carbon source for denitrification.
- Anaerobic Digestion with Biogas Utilization and 3<sup>rd</sup> Party Composting (Class A) Arcadis will assess
  the required upgrades to thicken, anaerobically digest and dewater biosolids to produce Class B
  biosolids. Arcadis will assess dewatering options of BFPs and centrifuges. Arcadis will contact several
  third-party entities to assess the feasibility of hauling Class B biosolids to a regional composting facility
  privately owned and operated that would ultimately produce Class A biosolids. Arcadis will assess the
  utilization of biogas to fuel a combined heat and power (CHP) system or renewable natural gas system
  (RNG).

For each alternative will Arcadis will conceptually assess the following ancillary processes:

- Sludge pumping
- Biogas flaring and backup heating (for anaerobic digestion alternatives)
- Recuperative thickening (for anaerobic digestion alternatives)
- Struvite control (for anaerobic digestion alternatives)
- Product storage (for thermally dried biosolids alternatives)
- Biosolids loadout facilities
- FOG receiving (for anaerobically digested alternatives)

For each alternative Arcadis will conduct a sensitivity analysis for variable costs during operation that are not within SCSD control such as electricity, natural gas, and disposal costs. Conceptual construction opinions of probable costs for each alternative in accordance with Association of Advancement of Cost Engineering (AACE) Class 5 recommendations. Arcadis will prepare conceptual site layouts for each alternative and identify is additional land needs to be secured for the project. Arcadis conduct a workshop with the SCSD to assess the technical and financial aspects of each alternative as well conduct a real time sensitivity analysis with the energy and solids flow model.

## Subtask 8.4 Assess Liquid Treatment with Recycle Flows

For alternatives that include anaerobic digestion, Arcadis will assess the impact of nutrients in recycle flows on the proposed MLE liquid treatment process. Arcadis will prepare a BioWin model with parameters provided by SCSD. The BioWin model will be calibrated to match results for the proposed design. Arcadis will document the anticipated impacts if any and costs to mitigate the impacts. Arcadis will conduct two workshops with SCSD to discuss the findings.

Arcadis will conduct a limited model calibration by matching existing key parameters such as solids retention time (SRT) and hauled sludge to verify influent loads more accurately. Arcadis will utilize the model results to inform subtask 8.3. Please note that Arcadis will provide a technical memorandum on the liquid treatment impacts, but all insights provided shall be verified by the engineer of record (others) for the liquid treatment upgrades.

# Subtask 8.5 Prepare Preliminary Engineering Report

Arcadis will prepare a Preliminary Engineering Report in general accordance with the requirements required by the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation (NYS EFC). The report will be completed and submitted to NYS EFC on or before July 16, 2021 for SCSD to apply for funding in the 2022 fiscal cycle. The alternatives analysis conducted under subtask 8.3 will be summarized generally in the preliminary engineering report and the recommended alternative determined at the workshop will be outlined in more detail.

### Subtask 8.6 Funding Assistance

New York State has announced that the 2022 funding cycle will include over \$1B in grant opportunities for water and wastewater infrastructure. Previous funding cycles included Water Infrastructure Investment Act (WIIA) grants of \$5M for financings less than \$50M, \$12.5M for financings less than \$100M and \$25M for financings greater than \$100M. Grants for issued by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYS DEC) through the Water Quality Improvement Program (WQIP) have been up to \$10M or 60% of a project's cost.

Recognizing that SCSD has several large infrastructure improvement projects occurring in the immediate future, Arcadis will assess the benefits of the various programs and consolidation of the projects from a financing standpoint to leverage the maximum available grants that SCSD maybe awarded. Arcadis will provide a technical memorandum outlining the recommendations for SCSD's consideration and, if accepted, prepare a technical memorandum and cost estimate for a bundled financing through NYS EFC, as well as other grant programs.

### Subtask 8.7 State Environmental Quality Review

Arcadis will prepare an expanded Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) documenting recommended alternative. To support this effort, Arcadis will identify and located wetlands on the north, west and southern boundaries of the property. Furthermore, considering the SCSD property is in the historical flood plain of the Hudson River and aeration project that was previously constructed completed a Phase 1A and 1B cultural assessment, we have included an allowance of \$10,000 to conduct a Phase 1A and 1B cultural assessment. Final

site layouts and consultations with the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) will determine whether that allowance will be required, however, if funding opportunities open earlier than anticipated we may recommend completing the assessments so SEQR can be completed in time. Arcadis will complete Part 1 of the EAF and prepare a cover letter for SCSD to circulate a request for a coordinated review.

### Schedule

See that attached schedule for the revised scope of services. We are committed to meeting the aggressive schedule attached by leveraging assessments completed previous for the Regional Biosolids Project. The schedule is predicated on meeting funding requirements for the 2022 funding cycle and positioning SCSD to maximize grant opportunities.

# Compensation

Arcadis will complete the scope of services for a lump sum fee of \$120,000, with an additional allowance of \$10,000 for conducting a Phase 1A and 1B cultural resources survey, if required to complete SEQR. Please note that the invoice prepared will be prepare at the Task 8 level and no data for the subtasks will be provided. We propose to amend Article 3 of the existing agreement between Saratoga County and Arcadis by reducing the task for Pre-design & Design Phase Services which is a \$3,325,000 lump sum task to \$3,195,000 and adding a new task for SCSD Conceptual Design for a total fee lump sum fee of \$120,000 with an additional \$10,000 allowance. C urrently SCSD is responsible for 50% of the \$3,325,000 compensation.

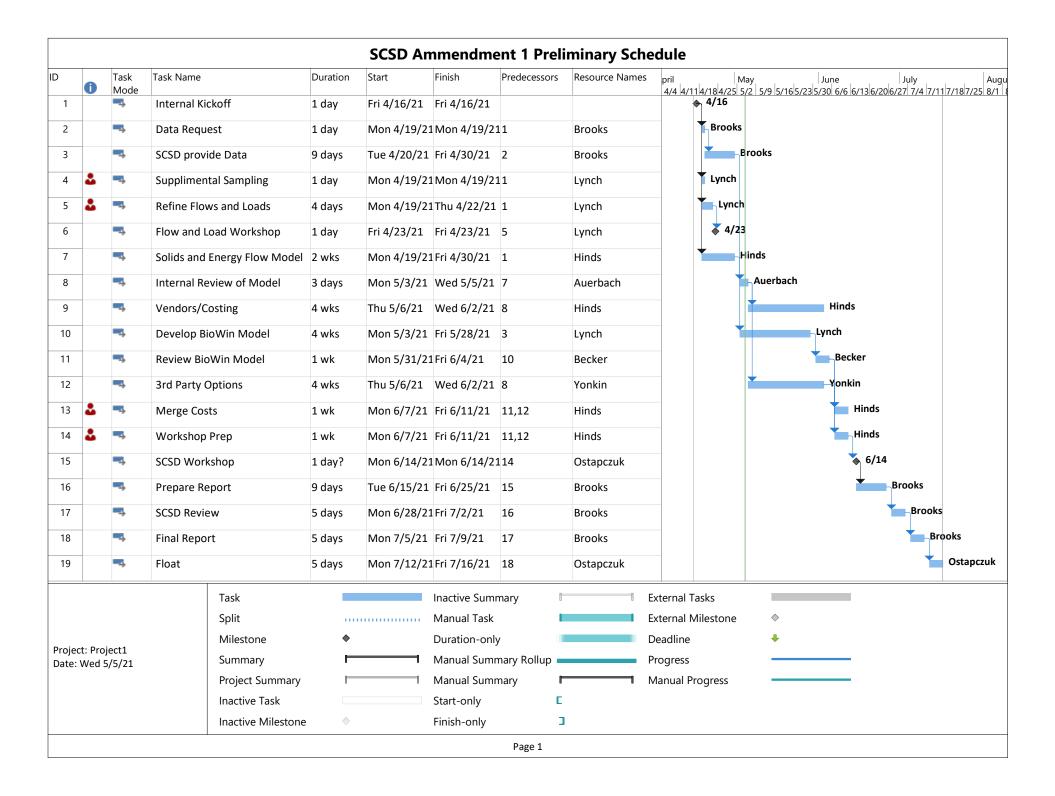
