Thank you very much, Madam Clerk. Agenda item five. On the today's order of business is a brief presentation by Dennis Moench from Saratoga Performing Arts Center. He is the Vice President of Education and he is here to address the Board in relation to SPAC School of the Arts. So welcome and pleased to have you, Dennis,

Dennis Moench

Thank you so much for having me. Here we go. Hi, thank you so much for having me, everyone. So for over 50 years, Saratoga Performing Arts Center has been known as a presenter of world class performances. Yet fewer people know that over the past five years, SPAC has significantly enhanced its role as a center for innovative and accessible arts education, and community programs. So I'm here today to show you a glimpse of all of the exciting things that happen every year in the world of SPAC education.

Therese Connolly

Well it worked two minutes ago.

Video Recording

Our mission at SPAC is to ensure that every child experiences the transformative power of the arts. That's why our arts education program inspires more than 49,000 students each year. SPAC works with more than 120 schools and nonprofit organizations in the Saratoga, Adirondack and Capital regions of New York State. In a single year, SPAC offers more than 400 education events at no cost to participants. And a growing number of students are reached every day through our expanding online education platform. This is how we know firsthand that art has the power to change lives. Support SPAC, and help us celebrate the artist and every child.

Dennis Moench

So you saw a few numbers very briefly in that video and I wanted to summarize them here. SPAC education has grown exponentially over the past five years from serving five to 50,000 students annually, working in partnership with more than 120 schools and nonprofits in the capital region to bring more than 400 arts education events to the community every single year. I know somebody once said to me, that's more events than there are days in the calendar year. And that's true, it is more we keep

ourselves very, very busy and often have multiple events going on within a single day. And during the pandemic SPACs educational outreach grew even more through the creation of two expansive online platforms of the SPAC Learning Library, which is our hub for highly interactive virtual arts lessons, and the Festival of new artists gallery, which is an annual virtual exhibition space for students, poets, Student Poets, performers, and visual artists. Now in order to paint a comprehensive picture I like to split the education department into these three branches. You saw the scope of our school and community programs in the video that I just shared. And those are the first two branches listed here. So we'd like to take a little time to share more details about our newest addition to the educational programming that we provide at SPAC and that is the SPAC School of the Arts. So in the Fall of 2021, with the support of Stewart's shops and the Dake family as well as the Charles R Wood Foundation, SPAC opened the SPAC School of the Arts, a year round the Center for Arts exploration and discovery, operating out of the Lewis Ace Wire studios behind the National Museum of Dance. Now the spec School of the Arts, which is better known to our students as SOTA. It is dedicated to providing accessible programming while furthering SPACs mission to facilitate Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and access in arts education. So it is incredibly exciting new venture for SPAC, and we believe that it can change the face of arts education in our area because SOTA aims to provide a welcoming environment for students of all ages and abilities so that they can explore new art forms in one place with both joy and confidence. Now as you can see from the images here, the three pillars of the school are currently music, theater and dance. However, what is unique to SOTA is that our classes often infuse multiple art forms and what lesson such as visual art, creative writing, and poetry. And we do that in order to highlight the interconnectedness of all art forms, and to deepen students perspectives. And the mission is it's not only to teach our artistic skills and technique, but really to use the arts as a vehicle for our students to create, not really to create a product or performance, but we employ full time certified teachers so that we can create innovative curriculums, and practice cutting edge teaching methods. So we're using arts education again as a vehicle for students to form deeper connections with themselves with each other and with the world around us. And that's why you see the three worlds at the top of this slide our mantra at SOTA is to empower our students to explore the arts, to connect with others and with the world around them, and to discover their inner artist. Now, SOTA offers weekly daytime afternoon and evening classes for all ages and abilities with art forms like group piano, group ukulele, acting improvisational theater, contemporary dance, creative movement, and so much more. Scholarships are available for any students who are in need of tuition assistance. And currently we have more than 300 students between the ages of 8 months to 84 years old. In order to further SPACs mission to provide inclusive, accessible and equitable opportunities to all students. We develop programs such as the one pictured on this slide. On Saturday mornings we present a special outreach program called Creative Connections, which is offered to children in underserved areas of the Capital Region. Now the children in this program are bussed to SOTA every Saturday. And they're provided with three hours of free music, theater and dance classes. We also bring in special guest artists such as the one pictured in the picture there on the right. That's our Country's Fifth Presidential Inaugural Poet Richard Blanco, who worked with the students in the creative connection program a few weekends ago to create a group poem about identity, culture and interdependence. And in the top left corner, they're working with a local African dance instructor as dance is being woven into how they express their poems and creative ideas. And finally, in the bottom, left, they're leaving our school with their bags, hot lunches, which are provided through the Business for Good Foundation, and Hattie's Chicken Shack. So we're currently in the middle of our spring term. And you can visit spacschool.org to

use class descriptions and schedules and to sign up to take advantage of one of SOTAs, many offerings. Those are a few websites that we have right there. We're also partnering right now with New York State Parks to offer a summer outreach program for underserved children in the Capital region similar to our Saturday program for children entering grades three to eight. And to learn more about everything that I mentioned just now you can visit spac.org/education. Or you can go to one of the dedicated sites listed here. Thank you so much for allowing me the time to share all this news with you today. As someone who has been bringing these programs to schools for a number of years now, I've witnessed firsthand how the arts has the power to transform lives. And I really hope to keep continuing to challenge the ways that we view arts education and, and to provide and ensure that everybody in our community has access to that transformative power. Thank you so much.

Thank you very much, Dennis, and thank you for enlightening us with the details of your program. It's most appreciated. The public may be interested to learn that the Board of Supervisors in this year's budget earmarked \$35,000, for SPAC for a marketing program. So there's opportunities there as well.

And they're also willing to host you to learn more about very bizarre parts of the process that we learned about, so I wanted to first publicly thank them, the Massachusetts Cannabis Bar Association. I look forward to seeing our own New York grown stickers soon from some of our farms, like they had in Massachusetts and also Mayor David Narkiewicz, who was the former Mayor of Northampton, when it became legal there. They went through all the details. So if anyone is interested, if your municipality has opted in, or if you're just concerned generally, I think they alleviated a lot of concerns of ours with regards to the public health and public safety issues. And they can tell us where they went wrong initially first. So Thank you.
